Epiphany is our time of “making known.” We began with the star, “making Christ known” to the wise men. On the first Sunday, we celebrated how Christ as “made known” at his baptism, a popular feast at that end of the Mediterranean, and immensely popular in Ethiopia, called “Timkat,” a time of gift-giving, feasting, and vast pilgrimages. What? You didn’t know that Ethiopia is served by its Orthodox Church of some 40 million, which, isolated by the Arab conquests, has developed a variety of its own traditions, and, sadly, frightful poverty. But I digress.

One difficulty in “making Christ known” is popular perception. In the Sunday *Parade* magazine of January 9, 2012, just as we entered Epiphany, the cover article on Daniel Radcliffe, of Harry Potter movie fame, quoted him as saying “My dad believes in God, I think. I’m not sure if my mom does. I don’t. I have a problem with religion or anything that says we that we have all the answers . . . . Religion leaves no room for human complexity.”

At age eleven, in 2000, Radcliffe was cast for the first Harry Potter movie, and he completed the series. “When I was cast, I was at a private school. . . and I was put into a film set with people from 100 different backgrounds, races, classes, everything. Suddenly, because of Potter, my world view got much wider than it would have been.” Somehow, in that world view, he sees “religion” as something that

“limits” rather than expressing the “limitless.” Poignant, because I see J. R. Rowling’s Potter books as this generation’s Christian apologetic, showing the power of love.

This political year will bring “religion” to the fore. We have just had the anniversary of *Roe v. Wade*. Abortion is an act of desperation. The notion is that the fetus is somehow dismissed. In my ministry, I have held two Requiems, requested by the mom, for the aborted fetus, named, but gone, and now commended to God.

On the intellectual side, we have those who seek to dismiss Charles Darwin’s theory on evolution. It is the desire for a changeless world. Epiphany calls us to move from being self-centered to being God-centered. This “change” is called “conversion,” and it continues throughout our life.

Another example. At one time Samarkand, in present day Uzbekistan, was the intellectual center of the Timur Empire which spread from Damascus to Delhi. Ulugh Beh, 1394–1449, known as the Astronomer Prince, brilliantly mapped and calculated the movements in the heavens a century before Copernicus. One of the charges that lead to his death was “blasphemy.” It marked the end of Islamic scientific study.

Epiphany calls us to “make known,” using what is in our hearts, and what we have between our ears, to show the value of faith to the world around us.

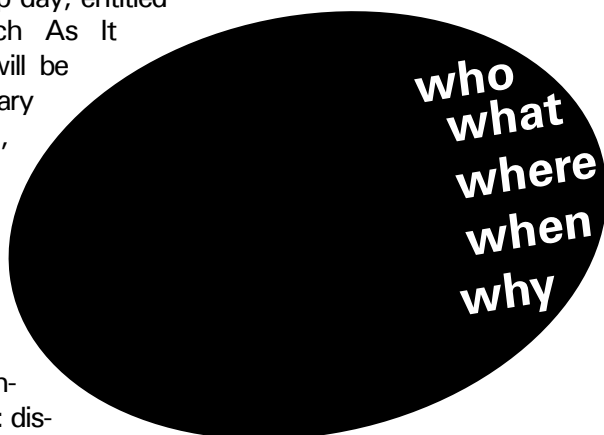

Trinity Guild met on Tuesday, January 10, 2012, at 1:00 pm, at Legate Hall, with five members present—Barbara Hector, Carolyn Hunt, Ann Chapman, Le Hector, Catherine Whitford, and Fr. Hector. The meeting opened with the ECW Prayer and the Lord's Prayer. Minutes of December 13, 2011, were read. Motion to accept by Le, s/ Ann. Passed.

The Treasurer's Report was presented with balance on hand of \$10,798.76. Motion to accept by Catherine, s/Le. Passed. The Budget for 2012 was considered. Motion to pledge \$3,000 to the parish by Carolyn, s/Catherine. Passed. Motion to accept the 2012 Budget by Catherine, s/Ann. Passed.

# Minutes of the Special Vestry Meeting

Saturday, January 21, 2012 (not yet approved)

---

The Trinity parish Vestry convened at the home of Jan Johnson on Saturday, January 21, 2012. It was called to order at 4:02 p.m. by Fr. Hector and began with prayer. Members present: Fr. Hector; Jan Johnson, Senior Warden; Fred Bowden, Junior Warden; Joan Faull (slightly delayed because of a doctor's appointment); Claire Holland; Mark Prouty; and Susanne Southwood.

## Discussion

- Jan said this is a brief meeting to discuss Fr. Hector's request for an extension of his contract, and the questions and concerns it has generated. She suggested we proceed as planned with tomorrow's Annual Meeting and election of new Vestry members, and said further that at Fr. Hector's request she had put the search committee on hold and informed Peggy Worzalla Bean that there would be a delay.
- Claire commented that adding another three years to Fr. Hector's tenure was rather like starting over with the appointment of a new person. Fr. Hector has said he is requesting the extension because of the economic climate and his family situation; Claire said that although those are legitimate personal concerns, we as a church must think about going forward. She suggested that we make no decisions about the possible extension now, but that we ask Fr. Hector to develop, in the next three months, a proposal outlining his thoughts as to how to move Trinity forward. Fr. Hector indicated his agreement with that proposal.
- Jan suggested that Fr. Hector

might work with the Search Committee—which we decided would now be better named the Discovery and Planning Committee—and guide them in their efforts to put together the background information that will be the first part of the search process when it is undertaken.

- Fr. Hector commented that the question here is, how do we deal with transition.
- Joan said she had talked with Peggy Worzalla Bean, the diocese's new Deployment Officer, who said we should not be undertaking a search in any event, this far out. Jan replied that she met last January with Bishop Miller and Canon Pfaff to discuss our situation, and the fact that, since we have a priest-in-charge and not a rector, it's the bishop's prerogative to appoint him or her. At that time, the bishop said the national church is putting new emphasis on the needs of small churches, with an emphasis on serving them with bi-vocational or retired priests. Mineral Point could be especially attractive to retired priests, and they discussed creating promotional materials to trumpet Trinity and Mineral Point.

Several months ago, Jan talked to Canon Pfaff again, who told her that Peggy was now the Deployment Officer; however, he recalled the earlier conversations and indicated they still had the support of the bishop to move forward with the search, as previously discussed.

Jan talked to Peggy about a month ago; Peggy wants to meet with people after our Annual

Meeting to lay out a plan for going forward.

- Fr. Hector said an assessment of the situation is important; Jan said we need to look forward with the Discovery and Planning Committee. She added that the new Vestry will need time to understand all the issues at Trinity, and reiterated that her opinion was the Vestry elections tomorrow should go forward, with Fr. Hector's proposal being done within the next three months.

## Other Business

Owing to major health concerns, Vestry member Susanne Southwood tendered her resignation to the Vestry on November 29, 2011. However, new health information probably makes it possible for her to serve the remaining year on her term. **Motion** by Jan that Susanne be appointed to fill her own unexpired term; second by Fred; motion passed with Susanne abstaining.

## Adjournment

Motion to adjourn by Claire, second by Fred. The meeting adjourned at 4:22 p.m.

# What will you pray for this week?

*A reflection by the Rev. Jay Sidebotham during the week of prayer for Christian unity*

**B**ULLETIN BLOOPERS abound, but my recent favorite goes like this: *The meeting of the Peace Commission is canceled due to a conflict.*

It reminds me of a story about a fight at a church I once attended (Relax, not at CHS). A group that served lunch to homeless people had to share a kitchen with a group that staffed an overnight shelter for a different group of homeless folks. Both were noble, heroic, tireless, inspired ministries, bound to each other by a common refrigerator, stove, sink and pantry. You wouldn't believe the fights that erupted over that need to share. It almost derailed those two compassionate, Christ-like ministries.

Then again, maybe you would believe it. Maybe you've run across it. Maybe you've been part of a dynamic like that. If so, you'll be glad to know that this is the week of prayer for Christian unity, a week set aside by the church, for the church to focus on what it means to live in unity with other people.

The week is bracketed by two special days. On January 18, we observe the feast of the Confession of St. Peter, a feast based on the moment that Jesus asked his disciples who they really thought he was. Peter answers: You are the messiah. Jesus says in response, that Peter will be the rock on which the church is built. (One heck of a rock, but that's probably a story for another Monday.)

On January 25, we observe the feast of the Conversion of St.

Paul, recalling his Damascus road experience, literally and figuratively knocked off his horse and set on a course by which the church expanded in a revolutionary way.

Peter and Paul were strong characters: gifted, committed, energetic. The New Testament makes sure we know that they had their run-ins. The Letter to the Galatians describes Paul publicly dressing down Peter, because Peter was backpedaling on the radical inclusiveness of the gospel. One of the New Testament letters attributed to Peter talks about Paul's writing, with this little dig: *They are sometimes hard to understand.*

**B**UT PETER and Paul found a way to live and work together, to respect each other's gifts and to change the world as parts of the body of Christ.

All of which is to offer this comforting news: From the beginning of time, unity has been an aspiration if not always a reality. Disagreements in communities (families, schools, workplaces, worship spaces) are hardly news. We are utterly dependent on God's help to live together. We can way too easily devolve into the kinds of interactions woven throughout the Bible, notably in one of the first chapters of the Bible, as Cain murders his brother Abel over a disagreement about worship.

So we pray for unity, not uniformity or agreement, in our relationships. For disciples of Jesus, it's a unity forged by a common call to follow him. So we pray in

his spirit, asking for more love in our hearts, expressed in honor, respect, kindness and compassion.

**T**HIS IS a growth opportunity for each of us. Who are the people in your life presenting a challenge to that spirit of unity, where you live or work or worship? Pray this week for them.

I often find that the best way to defuse a breach in unity is to pray for the person who I think has caused it. Pray today for yourself, for the strength to do God's work, and for the wisdom to see your own growth opportunities. Pray for the church, as this weekend we gather for our annual meeting, asking that even in our diversity, we can be bound together, closer and closer in the spirit of Jesus, with love in our hearts.

Pray for our world, where too often community is fractured, and where we need to remember that we live in an inescapable network of mutuality.

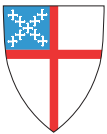

*"The first phase will include interviews with diocesan staff, officers, and leaders of congregations, ministries and organizations; and a survey of user experiences and expectations. The second phase will deal with analysis of the research, and exploration of various hosting and design solutions by the consultant and a small task force. The project will wrap up soon after Easter with a report to Bishop Miller and the Executive Council detailing the specific solution that supports the purpose and vision for web communication in the Diocese of Milwaukee, and how*

*the website can be best managed and maintained going forward.*
